

SINGAPORE MATH

Mathematics in grades K-5 is taught with a heavy reliance on manipulatives: physical representations of numbers.

Singapore math helps students move from the physical, concrete objects, to a pictorial representation of numbers, and finally on the abstract symbols and algorithms for operating on these symbols.

We do this not only to aid their understanding, but also to emphasize that mathematics is grounded in the real.

CALENDAR MATH AND FACT FLUENCY

- <u>Calendar Math</u>: Students will review foundational math skills such as identifying the date, counting on and back, and working with place value.
- Math Fluency: Students will practice their addition and subtraction facts daily.



READING GROUPS

- Students will receive small group and one-on-one reading instruction targeted at their level.
- Students will practice phonemic awareness skills, sound out and blend new words, and read Mac and Tab phonics books.

SPALDING PHONICS AND SPELLING

- Oral Phonogram Review
 - Students verbally recite phonogram sounds
- Written Phonogram Review
 - Students listen and write phonograms
- Spelling Words
 - Students sound out and spell new words each week



GRAMMAR, WRITING, AND POETRY

- Grammar: Students learn the basic parts of speech such as nouns, verbs, and adjectives.
- Writing: Students practice narration, copywork, and dictation skills.
- <u>Poetry</u>: Students listen to, memorize, and recite poems.


GRADES

- Students are assessed on multiple skills within a subject area using a scale of I through 4.
- Standards Grades Assessment Scale
 - 4 Exceeds expectations for skill
 - 3 Meets expectations for skill
 - 2 **Inconsistent** demonstration of skill
 - I Below grade level expectation

- Tests/Quizzes 40%
 - Weekly Spelling/Phonogram Tests
 - Math Unit Tests
 - History/Science Unit Tests
- Participation 30%
- Homework/Classwork 30%

HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

- Homework Folder: Your student will have a folder designated to hold their homework that they will bring home each day. Please check this daily for homework, classroom communication, and any returned student work.
- <u>Homework Packet</u>: Each week, your student will be given a homework packet to complete throughout the week. Please ensure your student completes all pages for the day of the week, then sign the front of their packet under that day.
- <u>Spelling Words:</u> Please spend time each evening dictating the phonograms and/or spelling words of the day to your student, then helping them correct any mistakes.
- Reading Log: Please ensure your student reads for 20 minutes each night, then sign their reading log once they are finished.
- <u>Late Work</u>: If your student does not complete or turn in their homework, they may turn it in the following day for partial credit.


