

SINGAPORE MATH


Mathematics in grades K-5 is taught with a heavy reliance on manipulatives: physical representations of numbers.

Singapore math helps students move from the physical, concrete objects, to a pictorial representation of numbers, and finally on the abstract symbols and algorithms for operating on these symbols.

We do this not only to aid their understanding, but also to emphasize that mathematics is grounded in the real.

NUMBER SENSE AND ROCKET MATH

- Number Sense: Students
 will develop numerical literacy
 and apply stronger mathematical
 reasoning when solving
 problems by engaging in number
 sense routines every day.
- Rocket Math: Students will practice their multiplication and division facts daily.



SPALDING PHONICS AND SPELLING

- Phonogram Review
 - Students verbally review and write phonograms
- Spelling Words
 - Students spell new words each week





GRAMMAR, WRITING, AND POETRY

- Grammar: Well-Ordered Language teaches students the skills of identifying parts of speech and diagramming sentences.
- Writing: Students learn how to create outlines to organize their thoughts.
- <u>Poetry</u>: Students analyze, memorize, and recite poems throughout the year.


GRADES

- Students are assessed within each subject area and given letter grades.
- Letter Grades Assessment Scale

- Tests/Quizzes 40%
 - Unit Assessments by Subject
- Participation 30%
- Homework/Classwork 30%

HOMEWORK EXPECTATIONS

- Homework Folder: Your student will have a folder designated to hold their homework that they will bring home each day. Please check this daily for homework, classroom communication, and any returned student work.
- Homework Pages: Please ensure your student completes all pages for the day and brings them back to school.
- Reading Annotations: For each assigned reading, students will need to mark their books by boxing new characters, circling new vocabulary words, and adding questions, predictions, or connections in the margins.
- Agendas: After you ensure your student completes all their homework for the day, please sign their agenda.
- <u>Late Work</u>: If your student does not complete or turn in their homework, they may turn it in the following day for partial credit.



PARENT ENGAGEMENT & SUPPORT

- Parent engagement and involvement spurs academic success. Please ensure that aside from homework, your children are reading high-interest books with expansive vocabulary and annotating both their homework readings and reading for enjoyment.

- It takes a village, let's partner and watch our students grow!


